Financial Support

ACRE has written to Government and taken up in meeting with civil servants the question of whether the Local Restrictions Support Grant (LRS) and the Additional Restrictions Grant (ARG), that are being put in place to support businesses that have either been forced to close or are seriously affected by the current Regulations, will be available to charities including village halls, reminding them that halls are now required to close for all but the most essential uses. ACRE have also reminded Government that information has been sought for Tier 2 and 3 areas since October.

Clarity has been sought on points such as:

- Whether the allocation to local authorities has been calculated to include Village Halls and other community buildings.

- Whether charity run buildings, especially those that are in receipt of business rate relief, will be eligible for the LRSG and whether it will be actively offered to them by local authorities.
- Seeking that guidance to local authorities makes it clear that charities and community buildings be included in the criteria for making grants under the ARG if, for any reason, they are not eligible for the LRSG.

Signs of progress have begun to emerge as a number of Network members (e.g. Cornwall, Sussex) are reporting that local authorities have agreed halls which have been required to close, or which are permitted to remain open but in reduced capacity, are eligible for a grant. Cornwall have kindly provided a response from one of their local authorities which references an FAQ provided by Government in relation to the Local Restrictions Support Grant for the period 5.11.2020 to 3.12.2020:

“So if the business rate owner is eligible to receive a grant (for example a local authority would not be, but a community hall in a separate legal entity or a charity would be) it is liable to pay business rates – even though the bill is reduced to zero through reliefs or exemptions and mandated to close, and they confirm that they have indeed closed then the grant is payable.

For businesses that can remain open in some capacity, but their substantive business is mandated to cease this does not preclude them from being eligible to claim a grant.

Q. What are the main things for Local Authorities to consider when looking at eligibility for LRSG (Closed) Addendum funding, in cases like village halls?

A. Local Authorities can assess three key eligibility factors: whether the ownership is eligible, whether the business in question pays business rates and whether that business has been mandated to close.”

A relevant point which halls with a Premises Licence for sale of alcohol may wish to use in making their case is that they have been unable to use their licence (or income seriously curtailed), while still bearing that fixed cost. One Council has indicated willingness to defer payment for renewal until a hall reopens, but cannot waiver the current year’s fee, issue refunds or defer until the hall next holds an event at which alcohol is sold. The alternative of not renewing would incur greater cost in applying for a new licence. As licensing legislation creates this position, a discretionary grant offers a convenient means for a local authority to help a hall meet the authority’s own fees.

A hall which had not re-opened since the first lockdown has found their eligibility for the latest grants queried by their local authority. It will be up to each hall to make its own case e.g. show the RHL Grant has already been spent on fixed costs over the last six months, it is on the rating list, is now or will shortly be digging into reserves held in accordance with Charity Commission requirements for maintenance work, and show good reason why the hall did not reopen.

Note: At the point of releasing this Update some halls in Sussex have received a grant.

Ventilation film

A short new film released by the government shows how coronavirus lingers in enclosed spaces. While designed to show how to keep your home ventilated, it might be helpful to halls. For example, experts are recommending that to remove any infected particles lingering in the room people either:

- open windows for short, sharp bursts of 10 to 15 minutes regularly throughout the day
- leave windows open a small amount continuously

It is also advised that any household systems that use outdoor air, including kitchen or bathroom extractor fans, are used correctly and regularly as an additional method to remove infected particles. [New film shows importance of ventilation to reduce spread of COVID-19](#)



Horsham District Christmas COVID Safe Project.

Horsham District Council are embarking on a COVID safe project in the run up to Christmas following lockdown to reassure the public and boost the local economy. Community Safety Wardens and Environmental Health Officers will be visiting town centres and villages over the coming weeks to reinforce the Prime Ministers message to remain 'jolly cautious' over the festive season. The aim is to engage with the public and visit local businesses to check that they have the necessary COVID controls in place to operate safely.

In addition to helping businesses with the ever changing COVID guidelines, the initiative will also provide people with the reassurance they can return to the high street, shops, bars, pubs, cafes, restaurants and other venues, to boost the local economy.

Businesses will be assessed against key areas of government COVID guidelines which apply to their specific sector and will include:

- COVID Risk Assessments
- Infection control
- Social Distancing
- Contact recording
- Staff training

The visits are not intended to be punitive but to enforce the public health message through advising businesses on good practice.

This innovative partnership project brings together Economic Development, Community Safety and Environmental Health working together for the good of the Horsham District. This follows on from the great work already done by the Councils Economic Development Team who worked closely with local businesses on re-opening following lock down. Some of the areas they will be visiting are:

- Storrington
- Henfield
- Steyning
- Horsham Town
- Southwater

Councillor Tricia Youtan Cabinet Member with Responsibility for Community & Wellbeing said ‘the run up to Christmas is undoubtedly going to be very busy for the retail sector. With Christmas only weeks away shoppers will be anxious to get their shopping done in time for the big day. We want to ensure the experience is as safe as possible.

It’s been a tough time for our local businesses coming out of a second lockdown, in addition they are faced with specific COVID guidance which is not only restrictive but can be confusing. This initiative will help ensure that businesses which are open to the public are COVID-secure, limiting the risk of transmission to both customers and staff. We must do all we can to avoid the Horsham District from going into a higher risk tier. Both the public and business have a role to play in to stop the increase of infection rates’.

Local support for NHS Test & Trace launches across Sussex

A new service has just gone live to support the national NHS Test and Trace system.

Working from West Sussex County Council's COVID-19 Community Hub, the service will take on responsibility for contacting individuals across East and West Sussex who have received a positive COVID-19 test result, but were unable to be contacted by the national NHS Test and Trace team within 48 hours.

Contact will be made to these individuals via text, phone or email.

The local service will also be on hand to:

- Provide advice regarding positive test results and requirement to self-isolate;
- Collect details of the individuals' contacts during their infectious period and enter them into the national NHS Test and Trace system for the national team to get in contact with;
- Offer additional support as required, including the wide range of help and advice available from the Community Hub service.

The service will operate between 8am-8pm seven days a week, including public and bank holidays.

Paul Marshall, Leader of West Sussex County Council, said: "Our COVID-19 Community Hub was set-up to support our most vulnerable residents when the pandemic started. The extension

of our service to now include support for the national NHS Test and Trace system is another example of how we are doing all we can to keep residents safe and our case numbers down.

“We are also really pleased that our team is supporting our neighbouring county, East Sussex, with their local Test and Trace calls. This strong partnership working highlights how important it is that councils continue to work together to keep residents safe during this challenging time.”

Keith Glazier, leader of East Sussex County Council said: “The ability to trace everyone who has tested positive for COVID-19 is vital in our fight against the virus. We are pleased to be working with West Sussex County Council to deliver a local service which will be invaluable in helping us to increase the effectiveness of the national system.

“We know that many people are often reluctant to answer a phone call from a national number they don’t recognise, and hope a call from a local East Sussex phone number will result in more people being made aware of a positive test result and taking the necessary action to protect others in our community.

“Our residents are doing a fantastic job in following the guidance and keeping themselves and others safe, and we must continue to work together and do everything possible to stop the spread of the virus and bring the pandemic under control.”

Residents in West Sussex who need to be contacted by the Community Hub will receive a text, call or email from one of the below:

- Text: COVID TRACE
- Phone: 01243 642153
- Email: West Sussex County Council Local COVID Tracing Partnership

The Community Hub will then ask individuals for the following details:

- Their name, date of birth and postcode;
- If they live with other people;
- Any places they've been recently, such as a workplace or school;
- Names and contact details of any people they were in close contact with within the 48 hours before their symptoms started (if they know these details).

The Community Hub will NOT:

- Ask for bank details or payments;
- Ask for details of any other accounts, such as social media;
- Ask residents to set up a password or PIN number over the phone;
- Ask residents to call a premium rate number, such as those starting 09 or 087.
